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## "We love because He first loved us." 1 John 4:19

One of the themes of 1 John is love; God's love for us, God's very essence being love, and how we can love others because of this love. This verse exists only through divine intervention on our behalf. The only way the connection between our love for God, His love for us, and our love for others is the work of the Holy Spirit. He, the Holy Spirit, connects our self-consumed and sinful hearts to God's gracious heart which is the very source of love. His love becomes our love. He initiates and offers this love, we respond and receive. This month, we challenged Lumin's writers to contemplate how 1 John 4:19 is evident in their lives.

Now that our kids are old enough to examine and observe our marriage, they have begun to call me out. "Mommy, you are NEVER wrong!" or "Mommy, you think you are perfect." Ouch. When I stop to take in the reality of Jesus' love for me, so much that He died on a cross selflessly when He had done NOTHING wrong, I awaken to the truth that I need to love better, more and differently. I need to be willing to accept my faults quickly, learn from them, acknowledge them, and offer an apology. I need to serve my husband more than he serves me. A few years ago, the Lord's kindness and love for me was expressed in a profound way through my husband, Graham. I often look back on this moment to remember my identity as a beloved daughter-- whose cup is overflowing with a love that is quite foreign to this world. Who is the Lord asking me to receive with gentleness, mercy and unconditional love, unlike anything they may have ever experienced?

As I walk through this day, I am praying for the Lord to show me who needs a tangible form of His love so that they, too, can experience the unconditional, perfect love I've received. Oftentimes I'm hesitant to care for someone because I feel empty, lacking, spent by life's demands. The truth is, the Lord is my sustainer and helps me one task at a time... He provides all that I need, so I have plenty to give without fear of running out. We have this abundance of love from Him—this fullness and certainty of always being loved no matter what mess we make—so much so that we can generously and freely love each person we meet with acceptance, grace, kindness and gentleness knowing He is fully capable of strengthening and sustaining us for this task.
